RSD High School Test Results Show Alarming Trend

In 2005, before the schools were divided between the RSD and the OPSB, approximately 4,200 10th graders took the Graduate Exit Exam (GEE). The schools that were transferred to the RSD received about 3,000 of the testers, while 1,200 remained with the OPSB. Over the years, enrollment declined and is now increasing. <u>But, no matter what the enrollment, one should expect that the RSD would test about 3 times as many 10th graders as does the OPSB.</u>

This is not so. In 2009-10, the RSD and the OPSB each tested approximately 1,200 10th graders. The RSD should have hundreds more 10th grade students to test. There are serious implications in this data. Large numbers of high schoolaged students in the RSD did not make it to 10th grade to take the test; and at the same time, crime rates in New Orleans continue to explode. There is a strong relationship between these two factors, and there must be an urgency to address this issue.

At the end of the 2004-05 school year, before the State Takeover, there were approximately 4,200 Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) 10th grade students who took the Graduate Exit Exam (GEE). In the 10th grade, they were administered the English and Math sections of the exam. With the State Takeover, the 4,200 students were divided. Approximately 3,000 of them were in schools that were transferred to the Recovery School District (RSD), and approximately 1,200 remained in OPSB schools. In the transfer, the RSD had considerable more test takers than did the OPBS.

Student enrollment declined in both the OPBS and RSD schools following Hurricane Katrina. Each year enrollment has grown and the division between the two systems in New Orleans has remained intact.

Now in 2009-10, five years following the State Takeover, the 2010 Spring test results reveal an alarming trend. With the RSD still in control of the same majority of New Orleans schools, the RSD has almost the same number of 10th grade GEE test-takers as does the OPSB.

Implications

The reforms are obviously not reaching those for whom they were intended. Rather than reform the failing students, it appears that the failing students are simply not making it to high school. The RSD inherited three times as many high school students as were left in the OPBS schools. Now both the RSD and OPBS test the about the same number of 10th grade students. Why do so few RSD students make it to the 10th grade? What is the relationship between this and the horrendous New Orleans crime rate? The more important concern is the moral obligation that our community bears to educate all of its children and youth.
